The quote does not exceed the CWC Schedule of Values. The Septic Committee recommends that the Board of Directors approve reimbursement in an amount not to exceed \$29,250.00.

**FUTURE STORMWATER PROGRAM**

**APPLICATION FOR ADDITIONAL REIMBURSEMENT NOT PAID BY NYCDEP**

**WHEREAS**, the 1997 New York City Watershed Memorandum of Agreement (Watershed MOA") paragraph 128 directs the Catskill Watershed Corporation (CWC) to establish a program

to pay for the reasonable and proper cost to design, implement, permit, construct and maintain new stormwater measures pursuant to stormwater pollution prevention plans required by the 18-39(b)(3) and 18-39(e) of the watershed regulations; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 145 (ii) of the Watershed MOA and the West of Hudson Future Stormwater Program Rules provides for payment of eligible project cost for small business, (50% by NYC and 50% by CWC); and

**WHEREAS**, by Resolutions Number 2192 and Number 2411, the CWC Board of Directors approved an application by JGJMS, Inc. (Prattsville Plaza) in the amount not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty-Nine Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-Two Dollars and Thirty-Four Cents (\$259,922.34) for design and construction of new stormwater controls related to the building of the strip mall style building and parking lot; and

**WHEREAS**, the CWC share of stormwater funding is 50% of the eligible costs for this project because JGJMS, Inc. is a small business under Watershed MOA Paragraph 145; and

**WHEREAS**, the Prattsville Plaza project was completed in August, 2014, and CWC provided final payment by check dated November 4, 2014; and

**WHEREAS**, CWC Future Stormwater Program Rules provides that if a project is applied for and is denied funding by NYCDEP, CWC Board may fund those eligible costs not funded by NYCDEP and also require the applicant to provide to CWC an assignment of claim for the costs denied reimbursement by NYCDEP; and

**WHEREAS**, NYCDEP has not provided any payment to JGJMS, Inc. within 90 days as provided by Watershed MOA paragraph 145; and

**WHEREAS**, as a result of the non-payment by NYCDEP, the applicant borrowed funds and requested that interest paid on that loan be an eligible cost; and

**WHEREAS**, the Program Rules require that the CWC Board shall review and approve each application, with attached documentation and staff recommendations; and

**WHEREAS**, the CWC Wastewater Committee recommended that the application by JGJMS, Inc. for additional funding be approved by the CWC Board in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-Two Dollars and Thirty-Four Cents (\$299,922.34).

**NOW, THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED**, that the CWC Board of Directors has reviewed the attached application, staff recommendation and supporting documentation and approves funding an additional amount of up to Two Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-Two Dollars and Thirty-Four Cents (\$299,922.34), for total funding of Five Hundred Fifty-Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Forty-Four Dollars and Sixty-Eight Cents (\$559,844.68).

**NOW THEREFORE, LET IT BE FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the CWC Board of Directors authorizes the Executive Director to receive an assignment of claim from the applicant and make demand upon the City of New York pursuant to Watershed MOA Paragraph 145 to reimburse CWC funds paid as authorized in this resolution.



**Future Stormwater Program Application - Prattsville Plaza**

James Eisel, Jr. and Jason Eisel have constructed a new building next to the Great American in Prattsville, Greene County. It is a strip mall style building and is less than 1 acre of disturbance within 100 feet of a watercourse. Due to the small size, no stormwater controls were required by New York State, and only NYCDEP stormwater requirements under the Watershed Regulations were applicable. The project received construction acceptance from NYCDEP in August, 2014 and CWC provided final payment by check dated November 4, 2014. CWC staff also provided copies of all payment requests, upon which CWC based payments, to NYCDEP.

Due to the applicant’s status as a small business of under 100 employees, CWC provides 50% of the reimbursement, and NYCDEP is responsible for the remaining 50%. Under Paragraph 145 of the Watershed MOA, NYCDEP is required to provide payment within 90 days of receipt of documentation. Despite an application and being provided with all documentation received by CWC, the applicant has not received any payment from NYCDEP. The applicant also stated that he has paid interest on a loan taken out to pay for costs not reimbursed by NYCDEP.

CWC staff recommend payment funding approval on the following costs:

**FUTURE STORMWATER MAINTENANCE**

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Paragraph 128 of the 1997 New York City Watershed (“Watershed MOA”), the Catskill Watershed Corporation (“CWC”) is the program manager for the Future Stormwater Program; and

**WHEREAS**, the Future Stormwater Program is intended to reimburse applicants for costs associated solely from requirements of New York City Department of Environmental Protection Watershed Regulations that are not also State or Federal requirements; and

**WHEREAS**, interest from earnings on Future Stormwater Funds can be used to reimburse applicants for maintenance costs associated with previously approved applications; and

**WHEREAS**, on August 6, 2013, by Resolution Number 2349, the CWC Board of Directors approved the Future Stormwater Application of Windham Carwash, LLC for 50% reimbursement of eligible costs in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$112,500.00); and

**WHEREAS**, on November 5, 2013, by Resolution Number 2397, the CWC Board of Directors approved additional funds to Windham Carwash, LLC for 50% reimbursement of eligible costs in an amount not to exceed Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred Twenty-Two Dollars and Seven Cents (\$16,522.07); and

**WHEREAS**, on January 7, 2014, by Resolution Number 2424, the CWC Board of Directors approved additional funds to Windham Carwash, LLC for 50% reimbursement of eligible costs in an amount not to exceed Two Thousand Two Hundred Fifty-Six Dollars and Twenty-Three Cents (\$2,256.23) for a total not-to-exceed amount of One Hundred Thirty-One Thousand Two Hundred Seventy-Eight Dollars and Thirty Cents (\$131,278.30); and

**WHEREAS**, Windham Carwash, LLC has requested Operation and Maintenance funding to maintain the BMP's installed as part of the NYC DEP required SWPPP.

**WHEREAS**, CWC staff recommends funding in the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for 50% of operation and maintenance costs; and

**WHEREAS**, the CWC Wastewater/Stormwater Committee has reviewed the CWC staff recommendation and recommends that the CWC Board of Directors authorize the President and/or Executive Director to enter into a contract with Windham Carwash, LLC for 50% of reimbursement of stormwater maintenance for a total not-to-exceed amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00).

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the CWC Board of Directors authorizes the President and/or Executive Director to execute a contract with Windham Carwash, LLC for a total not-to-exceed amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for 50% of maintenance costs associated with the Windham Carwash Future Stormwater project.

### **Future Stormwater Program Application - Windham Carwash, LLC O&M**

Windham Carwash was constructed in 2014. This site required a NYC DEP SWPPP. The stormwater best management practices (BMP's) included several rain gardens, a lined swale and a stormwater infiltration system. As a small business, Windham Carwash is eligible to apply to CWC and NYCDEP to seek reimbursement for maintenance costs and each organization is responsible for up to 50% of these costs.

The CWC Wastewater/Stormwater Committee recommends a Future Stormwater Reimbursement contract for operation and maintenance of this project for an amount not to exceed \$5,000.00. This contract can be revised if and when additional funds are required.

**WHEREAS**, the 1997 New York City Watershed Memorandum of Agreement (Watershed MOA”) paragraph 128 directs the Catskill Watershed Corporation (CWC) to establish a program to pay for the reasonable and proper cost to design, implement, permit, construct and maintain new stormwater measures pursuant to stormwater pollution prevention plans solely required by the 18-39(b)(3) and 18-39(e) of the watershed regulations and not otherwise required by State or federal law; and

**WHEREAS**, by Resolution Number 2803, the CWC Board of Directors previously approved a reimbursement application by Chris Barber for funding of eligible design costs in the not-to-exceed amount of Twenty-Nine Thousand Five Hundred Seventy-Two Dollars (\$29,572.00) for the design and implementation of an eligible project; and

**1:05:05 Interest Rates**

The REDI Loan Interest Rate shall be the higher of one-half the Prime Interest Rate plus one percent or 4% for both for-profit and not-for-profit Applicants. Loans with a maturity of seven years or less shall be amortized at a fixed rate over the term of the loan such that it is paid in full at its maturity date. The interest rate on loans with a maturity exceeding seven years and not granted a waiver by the CWC Board shall be adjusted to the current CWC interest rate in effect on the fifth anniversary of the loan and every five years thereafter and amortized such that it is paid in full at its maturity date. The Loan Committee may recommend up to a 1% higher rate of interest from the normal rate when a waiver is required from any CFF Program Rule. For the purposes of loan servicing, interest rate shall not exceed 10%.

**The CWC Board, in its sole discretion, may set the interest rate ¼ % below the Prime Rate if all of the following criteria are met:**

- a. The borrower(s) is/are a low to excellent credit risk;**
- b. The debt service coverage is 1:20:1 or higher;**



- c. **The collateral coverage is 1.10:1 or higher; and**
- d. **The borrower(s) has/have a positive adjusted net worth.**

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to the CFF Program rules the CWC Loan Committee has reviewed an underwriting report for The Sedgwick House B&B; and

**WHEREAS**, the CWC Loan Committee has recommended approval of the CWC Loan application from The Sedgwick House B&B, waiving the participating lender requirement; and

**WHEREAS**, the CWC staff has reviewed and processed this application, and submitted a loan application report to the Board of Directors, attached hereto; and

**WHEREAS**, the Executive Director, pursuant to the CFF Program rules, has evaluated and determined that this loan meets the criteria for a qualified economic development project, said recommendation is attached hereto and made a part hereof; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to the CFF Program Contract a condition of CFF loans (and grants) is that the recipient shall comply with all applicable provisions of the New York City Watershed regulations, as well as other applicable laws, rules and regulations; and

**WHEREAS**, prior to closing on this loan, all applicable approvals will have been received by the applicant; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to the CFF Program rules only the CWC Board of Directors may make an award from the CFF to an applicant.

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, the CWC Board determines The Sedgwick House B&B's application meets the CWC CFF qualified economic development criteria and approves of the loan application in the amount of Three Hundred Forty-Nine Thousand Dollars (\$349,000.00) for a term of fifteen (15) years, with an amortization of twenty (20) years, at a rate of four percent (4.0%), adjustable every five years to the CWC rate in effect at that time, such that the outstanding principal is fully paid on the one hundred and eightieth (180<sup>th</sup>) payment date and further waives the requirement of a participating lender pursuant to CFF Program Rule § 1:05:02.

#### **QEDP Evaluation and CWC Staff Recommendation**

##### **Purpose: To review the CWC Loan Application of The Sedgwick House B&B**

The Executive Director of the CWC makes the following evaluation concerning a REDI Fund Loan to The Sedgwick House B&B located in the Town of Hunter, NY. Evaluation is based on the Evaluation Criteria established in the Catskill Fund for the Future Program Rules, approved on August 22, 2001 by the CWC Board of Directors.

1. Based on due inquiry to the NYSDEC, the NYCDEP and to the best of CWC's knowledge, the property at 7760 Main Street, Hunter, NY, to be purchased by The Sedgwick House B&B, is presently in compliance with all applicable environmental statutes and regulations.

2. Based on due inquiry to the NYSDEC, the NYCDEP and to the best of CWC's knowledge, the property at 7760 Main Street, Hunter, NY, to be purchased by The Sedgwick House B&B, is not subject to any enforcement actions by any regulatory agency.
3. (a) To the best of CWC's knowledge, the project is consistent with historic land use patterns, available infrastructure and sensitivity to the need for water quality protection.
  - (i) The Sedgwick House B&B, located 7760 Main Street, Hunter, NY, will continue operation as a Bed and Breakfast
  - (ii) The project is located in the Town of Hunter.
  - (iii) The project will utilize a WWTP.
  - (iv) The project appears to present no threat to water quality.
  - (v) The project appears to generate no materials with the potential to degrade water quality that are not pretreated prior to release.
  - (vi) Based on NYCDEP the project is in the 60 day travel time.
  - (vii) There is no impact on Federal or State wetlands.
- (b) The project maintains the character of the Town of Hunter.
  - (i) The project is consistent with current zoning.
  - (ii) The project is compatible with surrounding land uses.
  - (iii) The project will not generate excessive traffic.
  - (iv) The project as described is of such magnitude that it does not appear likely to promote secondary growth and therefore requires not additional review of land use plans or infrastructure.
4. The project is consistent with the West of Hudson Economic Development Study, which has been completed.
5. Not applicable.

*Martin Donnelly noted the low equity contribution and the low success rate for similar businesses. James Eisel noted the downturn in tourism. There was a brief discussion between the Board and CWC staff regarding the possibility of reintroducing the loan if the applicant could provide additional equity.*
